




Snapshot of calls for proposals in 2021-2027 (1/3)

1st call, 75%



16% - ongoing calls


84% - restricted calls

Key take away 1/2

- ❖ Prepare and provide to potential applicants all the relevant supporting documents such as application form, Programme implementation manual/fact sheet and tools in order to prepare good project proposals pipeline;
- Simplify the manuals procedures and tools for the potential applicants and providing thorough interpretation/explanation of the Programme's indicators, objectives and envisaged results;
- Enhance the coordination between all the programmes bodies (especially JS and CPs) to ensure the same information is disseminated to potential applicants;
- Ensure proper planning of resources needed especially with regard to human resources (both internal and external);



Key take away 2/2


- Choose the "right moment" to launch your call for proposal by avoiding holiday periods and make sure that potential applicants have the proper time to prepare and submit quality project proposals;
- Coordinate call(s) calendar with other Interreg programmes and/or other funds in order to avoid any overlaps and attract relevant project applicants and project ideas;
- Set up of match-making communities or best project' outputs/results database in order to ease partner search and attract/inspire new applicants;
- Capitalisation strategy is important especially when combined with the communication plans and activities to enhance the quality of the proposals;
- Get the balance right between meeting the programme indicators, respecting decommitment targets, ensuring a stable cash flow and involving capable applicants.



Briefing note on project selection - Interreg 2021-27

Version 1, August 9, 2022

The document has been prepared by Interact following discussions with services of DG Regio. It is, thus, not an official document of the European Commission nor an official position of the European Commission.

This document is a guideline to help programmes. It does not impose a 'one-size-fits-all' as programmes have different practices. It highlights some elements against which the Commission may review the admissibility/eligibility / quality criteria.

This note has been prepared as a follow-up to the two webinars on the selection we had in May 2022 (May 12 and 19, 2022). With this note, we want to illustrate the

When taking a closer look at the assessment and selection criteria the Commission will be particularly vigilant on the following five aspects:

- (1) Cross-border impact as eligibility criteria;
- (2) Economic and social durability;
- (3) Horizontal principles (gender equality, accessibility, human rights);
- (4) Eco-conditionality to ensure environmental sustainability (linked with the Don-No-Significant-Harm (DNSH) principle and the role of the Strategic Environmental

Please note that this document covers the legal requirements for the selection of standard and small-scale projects. Provisions for the selection procedures for small projects in the Small Project Fund (SPF) are covered in Article 25 of the Interreg Regulation and have been presented and discussed in an ongoing series of webinars on SPF.

¹ We use the term 'small-scale projects' for the second option to meet the requirements according to Article 24 of the Interreg Regulation. Cross-border programmes have to go either for small projects in the SPF or for other projects of limited financial volume. Fact Sheet: Project Selection Process

Period 2021-27: Version 2, November 2022

This is the revised fact sheet on the complaints procedure, updating previous guidance in the 2014,2020 period to reflect the position in 2021-2027. We recommend to read also the briefing note on project selection¹ since it provides tips on issues of particular importance for the Commission.

What is project selection about?

The aim of the selection process is to select those projects that contribute best to the achievement of programme objectives. It starts with the received project applications and ends with the selection of the projects. There are the replaces in the selection process: (1) call for proposals with received project proposals; (2) assessment process divided in three steps - (a) administrative check, (b) eligibility check, and (c) quality assessment; (3) selection procedure followed by a vote from the Monitoring/Steering Committee. The next step in the project life cycle is the contracting of selected projects.

Why we are discussing it?

The selection process is a crucial part of the programme life cycle, because good and well performing projects are the decisive element for sound programme results. The programme needs to determine to what extent each project will contribute to the achievement of programme objectives and if the partnership is able to implement the project with the given resources.

Due to the nature of Interreg programmes, several agreements regarding the selection process need to be negotiated already at the programming stage and before the first call for proposals opens.

Reference to the regulations & major novelties

The limited funding for Interreg underpins the need for a quality approach along all steps of the project cycle. Selection criteria should support the selection of operations having a lasting impact. Also, a recent Special Report of the European Court of Auditors (ECA) on project selection in cross-border cooperation programmes² emphasises the need for sound, fair and transparent selection systems at programme level.

Interreg Regulation (EU) 2021/1059 (Art. 22) describes the selection of operations in Interreg programmes. According to this article (22.1) operations under cooperation programmes shall be selected by a monitoring committee (MC), which in turn may set up a steering committee (SC) that acts under its responsibility for the selection of operations. There is one exception to the general rule of decision-making by the MC.

When all or part of an operation is implemented outside the programme area inside or outside the Union, the selection of that operation shall require the explicit approval by the managing authority in the monitoring committee or, where applicable, the steering committee (cf. article 22 (1) Interreg).

Article 73 in the Common Provisions Regulation (CPR) on the selection of operations by the managing authority (MA) does not apply to Interreg.3

For the selection of operations, the MC or, where applicable, the SC shall establish and apply non-discriminatory and transparent criteria and procedures. Prior to selection the MC has to verify compliance with several well-known principles such as contribution to programme objectives and value for money or the so-called horizontal principles*, non-infringement of operations with the Treaty on the Functioning of the EU (TFEU, i.e. the fundamental EU-law).
