



The selection process: key steps





The selection process: potential risks

Stage	Potential risk	Initial risk assessment	Adverse consequences
Guidance to applicants	Biased view on topics, guidance shaped by specific regional interests, "human factor"	High	Specific calls can lead to preferences for topics in the interest of MC members

The selection process: potential risks 2/3

Stage	Potential risk	Initial risk assessment	Adverse consequences
Quality assessment	Biased view of assessors (internal, external) driven by personal interests, missing four eyes principle	High	Biased view in the assessment could lead to the selection of preferential projects driven by personal interest of individuals or small groups

The selection process: potential risks

Stage	Potential risk	Initial risk assessment	Adverse consequences
Selection in the MC	ne The selection is in mostly linked to the assessment results – thus Col inherent to assessment will be transported to decision-making	High	JS might not want to have risky projects, thus recommendations for approval might favour well-known applicants, new applicants with innovative but difficult approaches might have lower chances for approval



What is conflict or interest (CoI)?

A conflict of interest exists where the *impartial and* objective exercise of the functions of a person involved in implementing the EU budget is compromised for reasons involving family, emotional life, political or national affinity, economic interest or any other direct or indirect personal interest.

*objectively perceived







Who is concerned in shared management?

> National, regional and local authorities



Examples:

- ✓ A head of MA who is at the same time in the board of a beneficiary (even public)
- ✓A member of a monitoring committee selecting the projects for which his daughter in law offers consultancy
- ✓ An external expert evaluating grant applications he previously wrote
- ✓A staff member of a control and certification department verifying expenditures form the company of his/her partner
- ✓ A member of the Government who has the power to influence the selection of operations and who has shares in a company applying for funding

When are we in conflict of interest?

A conflict of interest can arise even if the person does not actually benefit from the situation

A mere link with beliefs, views, opinions or preferences of the person does not usually or automatically constitute a personal interest (but each case may be different from the other).



What to do? Programme level.

- ✓ Raise awareness. Explain. Set the tone.
- ✓ *Set in place policies, rules and procedures.*
- ✓ Other measures (use Arachne)





Obligations when a risk of Col arises

Reporting a risk of Col to a hierarchical superior



Confirming in writing by the superior whether Col exists

Ceasing all activity in the matter + taking any other action in line with applicable law




Examples of measures in MS

- ✓ Declaration of interest, Declaration of assets
- ✓ Abstention from voting, Refrain from participation in debate, expression of opinion
- ✓ Guidance to avoid conflict of interest
- ✓ Ethics referent within the Managing Authority
- ✓ Whistleblowing system
- ✓ Code of conduct for Programme staff
- ✓ Managers in Government not allowed to own more than 10% in companies
- ✓ Companies who have owners managers of Government excluded from public procurements
- ✓ Obligation for those who have shares in a company and then take a job in Government to make the necessary arrangements








Diagram managing structures







Monitoring Commitee decision: SK-AT case study

- Nominations: members of advisory capacities such as the representatives of the embassy
- MC meetings set up: location and rotation principle
- Trust: when assessing and selecting project MA/JS ensure the process is transparent
- · Ranking having rather low importance
- Rules of procedure: MC decision by consensus needs time (MC pre-meeting if necessary)
- Implement what suits your programme the best: such as "put on hold procedure"




